MUSIC AT GRACE!

The music department at GCS has been very busy the past several weeks. From the young ones in TK-5, to the Middle School and High School, the spring brings a lot of activity.

For the first time ever, Grace Christian is a member of the Michigan State Band and Orchestra Association (MSBOA). As a member, we can attend different festivals and competitions that previously we were unable to attend. One of these events is Solo/Ensemble. For S/E, students prepare a solo piece or a small ensemble piece. On February 28th, ten of our high school students attended our first Solo/Ensemble event at Southwestern



Michigan College. Students performed before a judge and were given a rating. A "1" rating is superior, "2" is excellent, and the ratings continue through a "5" which is poor. Students receiving a "1" or "2" receive a medal. Students receiving a "1" rating are eligible to participate at the State Solo/Ensemble festival in March.

- Due to earning a Division 1 rating, Sara Rutgers and members of the Woodwind Quartet will participate at the State Solo/Ensemble on March 15th at Portage Northern High School.

On February 28th, the Middle School Band and the High School Band traveled to St. Joe High School to participate in the MSBOA Band Festival. Both bands had prepared three selections and performed them before a panel of three judges. The bands are judged on rhythm, tone, interpretation, intonation and overall performance. The same rating system is used as the Solo/Ensemble system. After performing the three tunes, the band relocated to a "sight-reading room". In the sight-reading session, the band is given five minutes to prepare a song that neither the band nor conductor have ever seen. Students are not allowed to play their instruments during this 5-minute rehearsal. They can sing, clap etc... At the end of the five minutes, the band performs the song for a judge and is given a rating. It is a test of how well a band can read music and incorporate other musical skills they have been taught in class. Both the Middle School Band and the High School Band received a "2" rating, which is very impressive, especially considering it was their first time at this type of festival. GCS was the only private school in attendance at the festival.

The following week, both bands and members of the Middle School Choir attended the ACSI Music Festival in Bourbonnais, IL. This is an annual overnight event that the students look forward to each year. GCS joined

several other Christian schools from Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota, to rehearse and perform a concert on March 8th at Olivet Nazarene University in Illinois. Students rehearsed for many hours on Friday and after a somewhat restful evening at the hotel, performed an amazing concert at ONU on Saturday. This event gives our students an opportunity to sing/play in a much larger group than they normally perform. It also allows them to learn musical literature that would be impossible for smaller groups to perform.
